Invercargill Methodist Parish Report on the Financial Accounts for the year ended 30 June 2023

Attached are two pages from the 14-page printed Annual Accounts for our Invercargill Parish covering the twelve months ending 30 June 2023. Statement of Financial Position Statement of Financial Performance

Copies of the full set of accounts are available on request at our office.

The Financial Reporting Act 2013 together with amendments made to the Charities Act, means that it is mandatory for registered charities to produce financial statements in this format.

The actual results to 30 June 2023 record a surplus of \$34,082 compared with a budgeted deficit of (\$56,373). This result exists because the Methodist Church grants of \$75,500 that we have received are included in the accounts.

You will be aware that our Parish was awarded a MCNZ Green Grant of \$49,500 for solar panels and we also received a CBL Property Development Grant of \$26,000 for repairs to the external brickwork. The brickwork

maintenance is necessary, and the solar panels will reduce our reliance on purchasing electricity.

To show the true situation to 30 June 2023 (that is the financial position before we received these grants) I have deducted this grants income from the figures, and this results in a deficit of (\$41,418) compared with a budgeted deficit of (\$56,373).

As I have previously mentioned the Methodist Church of New Zealand has adopted a nil rate (0%) for depreciation on buildings, with the rational being that given that the residual value of land and buildings is expected to be higher that the initial cost value (assuming that maintenance is kept up to date), there is no expense to spread over the life of the asset. Depreciation has however been charged on contents, plant and equipment.

Comments on the results:

 The rental income received from the Lindisfarne Centre Building at \$35,393 is ahead of budget by \$11,893, however we do have repairs to undertake including the brickwork.
 We were fortunate in having part of the cost of the new carpet covered by a generous donation.

- Rental on the Miller Street house continues to be received, however costly repairs and maintenance are being undertaken to keep the property in good order.
- Our Offerings income, which is the major source of revenue for the Parish this year totalled \$79,725.
 It is opportune to remind members that the available IRD tax rebate system is something that can be claimed, and if desired, gifted back to the Parish.
- The fundraising committee this year worked hard but due to covid19 pressures, several planned events were cancelled which resulted in being around \$2,700.00 behind budget.
- We are all aware that our Parish is very reliant on the Reserve Funds that have been previously generated and carefully invested to continue operating in our present form and that interest rates are not as high as they have been previously.
- Included with these papers you will find an item entitled Leaving a Legacy to our Lindisfarne Parish. It is there to explain just what a legacy or bequest is and what all is involved.

On your behalf I would like to thank our Minister Tania and our other staff who have worked conscientiously during the year, and we would also acknowledge all the people who volunteer and work diligently on all of the committees and groups.

Taking everything into account, our year has been satisfactory.

We should remain positive and optimistic and look forward to an exciting and challenging year ahead that we pray will be satisfying, rewarding and fulfilling.

2022/2023 Report for Finance & Property Committee.

This has been another busy year for the Committee. Lindisfarne Centre.

For some time, the Brickwork on the West and South sides of the building have been a concern. We applied for, and were provided a Grant from Connexional Office to fund repairs at a cost of \$26,000. The work has not commenced at the time of writing this report due to weather restrictions, but we expect it to commence shortly.

Our internet connexion has been upgraded to Fibre. A new Chest Freezer has been purchased thanks to a donation from a congregation member.

Also, the carpet in the Lounge has been replaced largely due to a donation from another congregational member.

The dishwasher has been repaired and the sound system has been reviewed including the purchase of a new headset microphone. The Wheel stops in the carpark have been painted and potholes in the carpark have been repaired.

We made an application to connexional Office under the Green Grant opportunity and were successful in receiving a Grant of \$49500 which we used to install Solar panels. This is operating successfully and providing a much-needed reduction in our power costs.

In addition, we applied to Synod, and were successful in obtaining, a Grant of \$26000 to install radiant heating in the Auditorium to replace the current underfloor heating in that area of the building. This is a much more efficient method of heating the area and is projected to reduce the cost of heating the Auditorium by 75%. It is being installed at the time of writing this report.

Health and Safety

In late 2022, after the government removed the majority of covid mandates, it was decided the health and safety committee no longer needed to meet separately unless it was required, and most health and safety issues would be addressed by the finance and property committee.

We have held two trial evacuations over the past year:

- In November and evacuation was held on a Tuesday morning and involved Laura and Tania as well as any visitors in our complex at the time.
- In May an evacuation was held with the Girl Guides

In November, St John replaced the pads in our AED machine, and more recently our AED machine has been replaced with a newer model.

We had a serious incident in May where the gas hobbs in the kitchen were left on, resulting in the kitchen filling with gas, luckily the gas was detected and there was no serious harm to people or our property. We are taking the necessary steps to hopefully ensure this incident is not repeated.

We continue to have facemasks and covid RAT tests available from the Church office if anyone requires them.

Remember, if you injure yourself, are involved in an accident, or spot a potential hazard in or around our Church building, please report it using the forms in the foyer to ensure we continue to keep our building a safe place for all.

Houses

Miller Street. A quote to repair a leak and resultant damage has been accepted. The work will be done in approx. 2 months.

Waihopai Street. Security lights and Garage Door opener have been attended too. (with thanks to Neil and Bryon)

General

Our 5 year maintenance plan is currently being reviewed

Resignation. At our last meeting we received the resignation of Eddie Bremer. Eddie has served this Committee for many years and his contribution cannot be overestimated. We want to record in this report our sincere appreciation for all those years of dedicated service.

Finance. David reports separately to the AGM but the Committee does review the Parish Financial report at each meeting. While this year's deficit is lower than budgeted it is still a deficit and the ongoing deterioration of the parish finances is a concern to the Committee.

Outreach Report 2023

The Outreach Committee has had a busy year. While fundraising continues to be a large part of our brief increasingly this is left to a smaller group of helpers as our community gets older and less able to do the physical tasks associated with our traditional fundraisers.

Our 2 big fundraisers have again been the Garage Sale and the Cheese Roll Drive.

Small amounts have been raised through other activities as indicated in the accompanying figures. However, most of those are designed as social activities and a small profit is not the priority.

Another fundraiser is our continuing provision of kitchen help for funerals. Although this has sat outside the Outreach Committee, we need to acknowledge the funds it provides. Thank you to all those who support us in all these activities and especially to the folk involved in their organization. Many hours of planning and preparation are involved.

Looking forward we need to find fundraisers that are less labor intensive and therefore can involve a larger number of our community while still helping to provide funds to keep our Church viable. It is great to see new faces joining our community and it is essential these folk feel welcomed and included. One way we can do that is through the social activities we plan. Games afternoons, Quiz nights and Mid-Winter Dinner help to provide these social outlets.

A new venture is occasional after Church lunches at homes with small mixed groups as a means of getting to know folk we may not always talk with at Church. Again, our thanks to those who make all these activities a reality.

We often don't acknowledge the group who provide knitted goods for distribution through outside organizations such as Pregnancy Help, My Plac and the Neo Natal Unit at the hospital. They provide lovely warm articles for many children throughout the city, a quiet effective outreach.

Brown Bags also provide continuing outreach. This longstanding activity provides support to some of the most vulnerable in the wider community. The demand varies from month to month. We thank you for your continuing support with donations of goods and money.

Tech Support Room Report

It has been another busy year for the tech support room team. Our team provides support to the preacher every Sunday morning, operating the sound system and PowerPoint, as well as helping those who read bible readings and the prayer book with the microphone.

As well as Sunday services we support a range of other services and events including funerals and providing sound for church quiz nights and dinners. We also help out with church groups as required when guest speakers have PowerPoints or require sound.

Some of our highlights from the past year have included:

Tech Support Room Upgrades:

The requirements for funerals have become more and more complex in recent years, which has made it necessary to upgrade some of our technology equipment and over the past year we have completed stage 1 of our long overdue upgrade programme.

Early in 2023 we replaced the computers we use for PowerPoint and Zoom with newer models, and also replaced the monitors. Brendon has recently completed a lot of work with an registered electrician friend (who donated his time to the church), to upgrade the electrical wiring, and install a number of new power points in the tech support room to ensure all our equipment is safe and cabling is kept tidy.

We have also installed a new mini power switchboard which has helped us to "future proof" the room for any future needs that may arise.

Zoom:

A newer addition to our work has been the streaming of services on Zoom, on a Sunday morning. We typically have anywhere between 2 and 7 people join our services by Zoom each week, and also record every service, enabling one of our congregation members who is not always able to join us at our regular service time to take part in our worship. Offering our services on Zoom is a valuable outreach to our community which we hope to be able to continue.

Sound:

We are aware of the constant struggles some congregation members have, hearing the service on Sunday mornings. We will be continuing our work in this area, and trying different ideas to ensure good sound quality is provided during all services.

The Tech Support Room team are on the lookout for more volunteers to help us operate the sound system, Zoom and PowerPoint on Sunday mornings. If you would like to join us and help provide this essential support on Sundays, please talk to Brendon or Darren.

Education-- Kids Club

We are so grateful for the Hare girls having volunteered to assist. Thank you girls.

But we are still looking for new teachers to assist us.

I asked that the congregation prayerfully consider assisting with Kids Club were possible this year, as this would help take pressure off those teaching and help "YOU", to get to know the children better.

Remember we are all in this together. So please pray about it and if you feel you are being called, please talk to Tania or Neil. Every little bit will help.

Anne Donaldson has stepped down as kids club convenor and Neil has stepped into this position in the meantime.

You will also remember the children's play at Christmas with the masks each child held up as the story was told. It was so good to see some of the younger children taking part for the first time. It was lovely to see them stepping out in confidence which I know the congregation really appreciated.
